
until our destruction is a reality—and America and England, once two great nations for God lie in the ash heap of ruined civilizations like ancient Rome and ancient Greece.

We preach a man-centered Gospel focused on the happiness and satisfaction of man. We have shrunken God down to man's size and taken salvation out of the hands of God and placed it in the hands of men. We get saved when we are good and ready by a decision we make, rather than the regenerating Spirit of God. Most so-called believers today sit on the rotten foundation of a empty religious profession that was still-birthed by easy believeism. Ninety percent of our congregations are yet unregenerate individuals with no reality of God in the life.

Our pulpits are occupied mainly by entertainers or CEO's who know how to run a corporation but they don't know God. In our pulpits stand teachers and not preachers, who

either just dish out information or funny stories, or read a Bible passage with a fill-in-the blank teaching methodology. We desire to keep our congregations busy and occupied during the service but there is no spiritual depth or transformation of the life. So we meet each Sunday for fellowship, sing a few upbeat songs while we clap our hands and sway our hips and we listen to non-expository message and we hand in our envelope with our tithe and we call that Christianity. Meanwhile, the world perishes and Hell fills up by the minute! Jesus never meant for us to build large buildings for our own creature comforts to present a "come and hear message" rather, His was a "go and tell Gospel" of the Great Commission. Your average so-called Christian today has no personal witness in their community—they don't even witness to their lost loved ones or neighbors. Like I already stated, our times are a very dark time and time is running out!



CHAPTER TWO REALIZING OUR NEED FOR REVIVAL

"In 1740 when God moved through New England it was called 'The Great Awakening.' Revival has often been referred to as 'an awakening.' At Gethsemane, Jesus faced the 'crisis point' of His earthly ministry and His disciples slept right through it. Today the church is in a 'crises point' and we are sleeping right through it."

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In the book of Hosea there is an interesting comparison of the backslidden Jews to an unbaked cake. We read in Hosea, chapter seven and in verses eight and nine: "Ephraim, he hath mixed himself among the people; Ephraim is a cake not turned." Meaning it is half-baked; done only on one side. The side that is visible appears to be presentable for nourishment but underneath it is uncooked and inedible! The Jews in the days

of Hosea were enjoying a period of peace and material prosperity under the reign of King Jeroboam II of Israel. But despite their outward prosperity they were spiritually bankrupt and so backslidden they were completely unaware of their spiritual decay. God tells them.

"Strangers have devoured his strength, and he knoweth not: yea, gray hairs are here and there upon him, yet he knoweth not" (Hosea 7:9).

And God laments in chapter eleven,

"And my people are bent to backsliding from me."

Today, the modern church is backslidden and completely unaware of her condition! We have a perfect picture of this from the Book of Revelation concerning the Laodicean Church. Jesus tells them,

"I know thy works, that thou art neither cold nor hot: I would thou wast cold or hot. So then because thou art lukewarm, and neither cold nor hot, I will spew thee out of my mouth. Because thou sayest, I am rich, and increased with goods, and have need of nothing, and knowest not that thou art wretched, and miserable, and poor, and blind, and naked" (Revelation 3:15-17).

A self-satisfied, self-reliant people are distasteful to a thrice holy God! There was a time long ago, when the church had power and influence in the land because the people of God relied entirely upon God in their daily living and service to Him. But the modern church figured out that we can get things done faster with money and manpower—but the church in former days operated on prayer and Holy Ghost power! Only a heaven sent revival can awaken us to our desperate and deplorable condition!

I was talking to Iain Murray, who was ninety-two at the time, about revival and I asked him the following question: "What do you feel is the greatest need for revival today?" He chuckled and replied, "Well, that's a pretty good question, isn't it?" and then he said, "First, we must appreciate the need for revival, and then believe what God can do to bring revival about; and to know our dependency is entirely upon Him." I thought that was an

excellent answer. The church at this hour must recognize the NEED for revival. We must exercise the faith and grace to believe a Sovereign God will send us revival. We must not rely on fleshly efforts to bring it about but we can prepare our hearts while we wait upon Him. A good illustration of this is what my homiletical mentor Dr. Stephen F. Olford described about revival, he said,

"I am forcefully reminded of an expository sermon on revival I heard from the lips of the great Dr. G. Campbell Morgan during my theological studies in London, England—many years ago! What the doctor had to say has helped me to understand how God and man come together in his holy business of praying down revival from heaven.

"Let me paraphrase what I heard and remember. Revival is a sovereign work of God. Jesus declared, 'The wind blows where it wishes, and you hear the sound of it, but cannot tell where it comes from and where it goes.

So is everyone who is born (or revived) of the Spirit' (John 3:8).

"Only God can command the revival wind. But, we must set our sails to catch the wind when GOD BLOWS! There you have it: we cannot produce revival, but we can ready ourselves to receive it when it comes."

When sleepy-headed pastors wake up to realize the need for revival, then and only then, will they pray aright and call their people to gather together to seek the Lord of glory to rain His righteousness down upon them in plentiful effusions of His grace!



CHAPTER THREE REALIZING OUR SPIRITUAL DECAY

"When we are not exercising our graces we slumbering in spiritual decay. Had Noah exercised his graces more than guzzling his grapes, he would not have lain naked in his tent sleeping off his hangover. Had Lot been exercising graces more than worrying about his skin, he would have been more aware to the depravity of his daughters. Had David been exercising his graces by leading battle for God rather than reclining on his couch he would have avoided the nakedness of Bathsheba and following the lustful inclinations of his heart."

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When the people of God fail to exercise their graces and fear God and serve Him with their whole heart, then they fall into the most grievous and aggravated sins against the Almighty without any concern for anyone but themselves and their own sinful gratification. The church today is ripe with antinomianism from the pulpit to the pew. The prevailing philosophy in our churches seems to be "once saved always saved, therefore I can sin all I want to and still go to heaven."

Holiness is a taboo subject in our pulpits today and many churches have fallen into compromise and conformity to the evil society in which they exist. When churches relax and recline rather than kneel and intercede we lose our power with God and our witness to the world. Instead of being on our knees and in our Bibles we are on our couches watching tv. We are full of the world instead of being full of the Spirit. The first step back to God is repentance; God declares: "Return unto me, and I will return unto you, saith the LORD of hosts" (Malachi 3:7). The first step toward revival is to be honest with ourselves in regard to our own spiritual condition and realize our spiritual decay. If we fail to realize our spiritual decay we will not recognize the need for revival! When the people of God realize their spiritual decay they will awaken out of their spiritual stupor and proclaim with Ephraim,
