The late preacher Warren Wiersbe said,

So, Paul warns in Ephesians 4:27, "Neither give place to the devil." The word "place" simply means a place, such as a city or a building. CHAPTER 1 WHAT IS BITTERNESS?

Anger, the symptom that is quickly passed over, especially in our current culture, is a tell-tale sign of some bitterness in our soul. Anger is an emotion that everyone does express. The Bible even says that God has this emotion, and we are created in his image. The Bible tells the Christian,

"Be ye angry and sin not: let not the sun go down upon your wrath:" Ephesians 4:26.

We will become angered over many things, some justified and others unjustified, and God's Word and Spirit will direct and properly help us grow in the knowledge of Christ. When injustices happen, there should be anger over that act, yet there must be temperance, or "vigilante justice" can easily break forth into greater evils.

The Wild West's vigilante justice is a good illustration. When someone was apprehended for an actual or perceived wrongdoing, an angry mob would form, demanding instant justice. Usually, there was one voice of reason in town attempting to get the mob to back down and let the process of law proceed. Sometimes this worked, and other times it did not, especially when solid passions and deep hurt have been inflicted, such as the murder of a family member.

In our day, these same feelings and afflictions abound, coming at us in various forms,

yet causing the same degree of pain and anger. Even when justice is served, it is common and natural in our old nature to not forgive those who have wronged us or caused us great pain.

Bondage

The path to bondage has begun, however, when we will choose not to forgive, and we begin to be ruled by another spirit, the spirit of anger. However, anger is not a stand-alone issue but is an offshoot of a sinister root. When someone is ruled by an angry spirit, where one is given over to anger or has a "short fuse," this is an evident token of some deep-seated pain or resentment. Anger breeds bitterness. Bitterness is defined as, "Keen sorrow; painful affliction; vexation; deep distress of mind."

Bitter - Sharp, Painful, Smiting.

Painful Experiences in our lives were once referred to as "Bitter," as "that is a bitter pill to swallow." So it is recorded in the book of First Samuel, chapter one, verse ten, "And she was in bitterness of soul, and prayed unto the LORD, and wept sore." This verse tells of Hannah, the barren wife of Elkanah, who also had another wife who did bear him children and who cruelly derided Hannah daily. In that day and culture, if a woman could not bear a son for her husband, it was the greatest shame she could face. For clarity, Elkanah having two wives is owning to a custom in that era. If the

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man's wife was barren, a "surrogate" wife was added to the family to have children in his name, as was the case with Abraham and Sarah, which was not of God but culture. This cultural norm brought consequences that never would have befallen each family had they waited upon the Lord or accepted the less-than-desirable results as his sovereign will. So the Bible calls Elkanah's second wife Hannah's adversary in verse six, "And her adversary also provoked her sore, for to make her fret because the LORD had shut up her womb."

While Hannah was praying silently, the priest, Eli, had observed her distressed and unusual state as Scripture says that he saw her lips moving but heard no voice. Eli even accused her of being drunk! Nevertheless, in kindness, she replied,

"No, my lord, I am a woman of a sorrowful spirit: I have drunk neither wine nor strong drink, but have poured out my soul before the LORD. Count not thine handmaid for a daughter of Belial: for out of the abundance of my complaint and grief have I spoken hitherto." 1 Samuel 1:15.

Bitter Root - "The Resurrection Flower."

There is a small perennial herb called "Bitterroot," whose genus and the species name are Lewisia and rediviva and is native to the Western United States. Its specific epithet rediviva ("revived, reborn") refers to its ability to
